Rotator Cuff Tears and Impingement - Management Guidelines for **General Practitioners**

These guidelines were initially presented by Dr Ken Yamaguchi, Washington Uni. Orthopaedics, USA. They are a resource for clinicians. I stress that they are only guidelines and are not applicable to every clinical situation.

GROUP ONE

DIAGNOSIS:

- Cuff is intact.
- Partial thickness tears.
- Cuff tendinosis.

MANAGEMENT:

- High success rate.
- Physiotherapy.
- NSAIDs.
- Sub-acromial injections.

Err towards non-operative management.

GROUP TWO

DIAGNOSIS:

- Small, medium-sized tears.
- Tears in younger patients (<60 yo).
- Acute tears:
 - o Any size.
 - o Distinct injury, <3 months.

MANAGEMENT:

- High risk of irreversible damage.
- Surgery

Err towards early surgery.

GROUP THREE

DIAGNOSIS:

- Large, chronic tears.
- Tears in elderly (>70 yo).
- MRI—chronic changes within cuff.

MANAGEMENT:

- Irreversible damage has already occurred.
- Physiotherapy.
- NSAIDs.
- Sub-acromial injections.

Err towards non-operative management.
